Philosophy and Goals of the Course

- 1. Preparation and Delivery of Sermons ("Prep and Del") is a contemporary introduction to the basics of "classic" sermon construction and delivery. This course will provide time-tested and readily-accessible tools, structures, and concepts that have been used by faithful preachers across centuries and in many cultures. The goal is to enable you to communicate the truths of Scripture with power and accuracy. You will simultaneously be taught to prepare messages that accurately expound biblical texts and effectively reach modern listeners.
- 2. Because this course is introductory, you will learn standard terms and structures that are "foundational" for preaching in every context and culture. You will *not* be taught that there is only one "right way" to preach. However, mastering the methods and concepts of this course will help you hone tools and approaches for different people groups, settings and cultures. Other methods and styles will be taught and encouraged in advanced courses.

Features of Student Evaluation (for accredited version):*

- 1. A comprehensive exam over reading assignments and lecture material (50% of Final Grade).
- 2. Preparation of key sermon components that will help you monitor your progress, and will also enable you step-by-step to construct a complete sermon. Total of 7 written assignments (20% of final grade).
- 3. Preparation of an original, complete sermon manuscript (7-9 pages, standard font and margins, double-spaced) as a final project (30% of Final Grade).
- 4. Students will be expected to actively participate in weekly group coaching calls with the instructor, and with other students in the online community platform that has been created for this course. Students are required to submit questions in at least 4 coaching calls.

*All graded work must be the student's own, original work according to academic plagiarism and honesty policies.

Note: All assignments are to be completed according to the schedule of the class in which students are registered. All assignments correspond directly to the course goals, stated above.

Class Structure and Progression:

- 1. Class lectures will incorporate reading assignments in the order of the list that accompanies your course description. Read assignments consecutively for each class.
- 2. As key components of sermon preparation are described in the lectures and readings, students will prepare and turn in examples of these select components in written form. This will enable you to build a sermon as you are learning and refining each of its components with the professor's feedback and coaching.
- 3. Students will interact with the professor and each other by receiving video lectures online, responding with regular assignments evaluated with feedback by the professor, and by regular curated group interaction with the professor in scheduled online office hour discussions.
- 4. After the comprehensive exam, each credit student will prepare a complete, original sermon for the final project (Students may use sermon components previously prepared and evaluated in the course to complete the final project). The goal is to prepare you to complete a sermon that best reflects what you have gained from participation in the course.

Prepare an *informal* homiletical outline on the passage below, corresponding to the first letter in your last name:

> A-G: Heb. 12:1-3 H-Q: II Cor. 6:14 – 7:1 R-Z: I Thess. 4:13-18

a. Remember that an *informal* (or conversational) homiletical outline words the proposition either as a truth <u>principle</u> all people should believe, or an <u>application</u> all believers should do. If the proposition is at truth principle,

then the main points typically are all applications (i.e., what we should do as a consequence of the truth principle). If the proposition is an application, then the main points are typically truth principles (reasons we should do what the proposition says).

- b. Include only a proposition and main points (not subpoints) in your outline.
- c. Remember to key main points to the text (i.e. put appropriate verse references in parentheses after main point statements.)
- d. Make sure your outline covers the entire text (in accord with expository principles.)
